Rotary Presentation Live Again

Westhoughton Rotary had two reasons to be pleased about this year's Bursary Presentation to the top Westhoughton High School student. After two years of covid restrictions, not only could they meet this year's winner, Tom Jackson, but also the School's Headteacher, Neil Coe, in person for the first time. Mr Coe told an audience of Westhoughton Rotarians and guests what a wonderful role model Tom had been in the school. Not only was he a top performing Triple Science student but also he was a respectful character who always stood up for what was right. In his GCSE results, his grade 9s put him in the top 3% in the country in all but two subjects where he got 8s.

Fourteen years ago, in Westhoughton Rotary's Diamond Jubilee year, the club made its first Bursary presentation in memory of a former member's distinguished service to the club and the community. In telling the audience about Tom, Mr Coe said that he understood that he was joining a long list of worthy winners who had gone on to achieve further success and bring more honour to the school. He was delighted that his mother and stepfather, Alice Rogers and Kenny Pain were able to attend Tom's Award Evening and help celebrate his achievement. Tom is now at Winstanley Sixth Form College studying Maths, Physics and Computer Science so should find the Bursary of a £200 Waterstones Gift Card a real help.

Past President Ronald Bell explained that the Club had wished to inaugurate a special award in the Club's Diamond Jubilee year as part of their celebration of 60 years of service to the town. In conjunction with the High School, it had been agreed to make it an annual award to encourage and celebrate academic success. He welcomed Jeannette Miller and George Davies thanking them for their support over the past 14 years. President Stuart Bailey congratulated Tom on his success and then presented him with the Waterstones Gift card, a Rotary Certificate and a mini trophy. He wished him well in his present studies and in his planned future career in Engineering. Stuart said how Rotary valued their continued contact with the high school and was delighted that Mr Coe was continuing the school's interest in the award. Mr Coe than addressed the audience saying how important it was to him that the high school was at the heart of the Westhoughton community. Having introduced Tom, he now introduced himself and spoke about what he was doing at the school. He'd brought several objects to illustrate his educational vision. They included the diary he'd kept of his first 100 days at the High School which contained reflections on daily events and progress made. He'd also brought a hi viz vest saying that he'd asked all of the Senior Leadership Team, and staff to wear them so that students would always be able to spot staff if they needed help. A book about Toxic Childhood Stress represented the need to remember that some children came from very difficult home backgrounds. In the lockdowns this had meant that they had had little opportunity to escape adverse conditions caused e.g. by violence or alcohol which



could affect behaviour and progress in school. He read a moving letter from two parents who expressed their gratitude that the school hadn't given up on their child and, by concentrated help, had enabled him to continue his studies and give him the chance of a better future. One size could never fit all in education and the high school staff were determined to meet the individual needs of all students. The president thanked Mr Coe for his speech and for all he was doing for local students.

A selection of students from Year 7, 8 and 9 were able to enjoy a fieldwork trip to Blue John Cavern in October, a great time was had by all, it was great to see trips running again in KS3. We are looking forward to more fieldwork trips in 2023. #geography #caves
